



# The 2011 UNL Summer Field School in Archaeology

## May 31 – July 8, 2011

The 2011 UNL Summer Field School in Archaeology will involve you in a range of field experiences from SE Nebraska to the Nebraska panhandle. You will learn to discover new sites and to investigate archeological deposits once located. You will learn to present your findings to different kinds of publics. You’ll dig, map, photograph, draw, catalogue, and present and earn 6 credits!

### **I. 31 May – 17 June ~ Central Plains Archaeology**

This portion of the field school will introduce students to fundamental practical and ethical issues in field archaeology. Students will learn basic field protocols—designing field work and sampling strategies—and techniques—mapping with GPS and other instruments, plan-documentation, stratigraphic profiling, test-pit excavation. We will be undertaking pedestrian archaeological survey in Lancaster County, focusing on finding and describing deposits with Plains Archaic and Woodland materials. The field school will be based in Lincoln; students will need to make living arrangements in the Lincoln area.



### **II. 20 June – 8 July ~ Panhandle Archaeology**



This portion of the field school will focus on archaeology in the Nebraska Panhandle. We will practice discovery and field documentation techniques integrated within a geoarchaeological framework. We will be operating out of the Hudson-Meng Museum and Research Center

facility on the Oglala National Grassland, near Crawford (NE). We will be living in a tent camp for the duration; students will need to supply tent and sleeping bag and pay for board.

Field School participants will earn 6 credits in Anthropology (we will tell you which courses to register for). In addition to tuition and fees (see below), students will be charged a field school fee of \$350, which covers transportation and related expenses. Students will have to pay for their own room and board.
