

From the Desk of the Graduate Director





Spotlight on Graduate Alumnus Dr. Paul Turman South Dakota Regental System Vice President for Research and Economic Development



1) During which years were you a student at UNL? Which degree(s) did you earn at UNL? When did you graduate? I began full time at UNL in Fall 1998 (having started part time) and finished in May 2000. I earned my Ph.D. with a primary emphasis in Interpersonal Communication and a secondary emphasis in Instructional Communication.

2) Why did you choose a degree in Communication Studies?

I found the field by accident having started out in Scenic Design. My undergraduate program had both Communication Studies and Theater and I happened to take a number of communication theory courses and I really enjoyed the faculty and the material. It seemed to be a logical area to pursue when I decided to go on to earn a master's degree.

3) What brought you to study Communication at UNL? We had two faculty members at South Dakota State University who had recently earned their doctorates from UNL. They always spoke highly of the program and the faculty. My thesis advisor worked with Bill Seiler and she encouraged me to put UNL on my list of schools and meet with him. Of all the visits I made, I never felt more welcomed by the faculty and students than I did during my first trip to Oldfather Hall.

4) What have you been doing since leaving UNL? I left UNL for a tenure track faculty position at the University of Northern Iowa. I left in 2006 to become the Director of

Academic Assessment for the South Dakota Board of Regents. The main office is located in my hometown and it provided an opportunity to pursue an administrative post and move closer to home. That position transitioned into the Associate Vice President for Academic Affairs and most recently I was appointed to be the System Vice President for Research and Economic Development for the South Dakota Regental system.

5) What is a favorite memory of your time in Communication Studies at UNL?

My twin sons were born during my final semester at UNL and the support I received from my classmates at the time is consistent with the collegiality that I think continues to be a fundamental part of the UNL experience. My officemates continue to be my closest friends in the discipline along with a number of UNL graduates who entered the program shortly after I left.

6) In what ways can alumni support our department and students?

In addition to the outstanding faculty at UNL, I believe the pipeline of young talent that continues to emerge from the program is a function of the support that alumni provide to the program. Encouraging your best students to consider UNL as an option when they are selecting Ph.D. programs is an important way to contribute to ensuring the value of your degree. I also believe financial support to the institution aids in facilitating two critical functions by (1) demonstrating to the institution the value that alumni see in the program and (2) providing much needed assistance for supporting the important activities that make UNL graduates outstanding scholars in our discipline.

7) What advice do you have for current undergraduate/graduate students in our department?

It's hard to imagine where your degree is going to take you once you leave UNL. I would have never imagined that I would find myself in a system office when I left UNL in 2000, but I know that my methodological background, management experience I received while running the Business & Professional Communication course, and the exposure I received in leadership positions at regional and national organizations all helped me be successful in the positions I have taken. Be willing to take on challenges and the unintended byproducts for such efforts are likely to emerge in the future.

Spotlight on Undergraduate Alumnus Dr. Kerk Kee Assistant Professor at Chapman University



1) During which years were you a student at UNL? Which degree(s) did you earn at UNL? When did you graduate?

I was an undergraduate at UNL from 1996-2000. I earned a B.S. in Mechanical Engineering, with a minor in Communication Studies in May 2000.

2) What brought you to study Communication at UNL? In Fall 1996, I transferred from a small private college in Malaysia to UNL to study Mechanical Engineering. I chose UNL because there was an existing relationship between my college and UNL. At my Malaysian college, UNL was recognized as among the top 100 engineering programs in the U.S., and Lincoln was known as a safe and affordable college town. That was my limited view of UNL.

3) Why did you choose a degree in Communication Studies?

In Spring 1997, I took COMM 283 (Interpersonal Communication) because it was a required course for all mechanical engineering majors at the time, and I "discovered" the field of Communication Studies. As a naïve undergraduate back then, I thought taking more Communication Studies classes would help me become a socially savvy engineer in the future.

4) What is a favorite memory of your time in Communication Studies at UNL?

In Fall 1997, Communication Studies was not an approved minor for engineering students. On October 19, 1997, I submitted a petition to the Department of Mechanical Engineering in order to declare a minor in Communication Studies. The petition was not approved. It took more persuasion with Mechanical Engineering and the College of Engineering. However, a little over a year later, the petition

was finally approved by the Dean of Engineering, Dr. John Ballard, on November 4, 1998. I became the *first* engineering student at UNL to declare a minor in Communication Studies.

5) What have you been doing since leaving UNL?

After graduating from UNL in 2000, I pursued an M.A. in Communication (2003) and an M.A. in Liberal Arts & Sciences (2006) at San Diego State University. Then I went on to the University of Texas at Austin and completed a Ph.D. in Organizational Communication (2010). In Fall 2010, I started a tenure track assistant professor position at Chapman University in Orange, California.

6) What has the communication minor brought to your career?

Despite winning second place in the E-Week (Engineering Week) Senior Design Project Competition with my team project in 2000, I decided to pursue graduate school in Communication and not an engineering career. Today, I explore the intersection of technologies and human communication, including working on a project that examines the ways in which scientists and engineering researchers use an NSF funded supercomputing network to engage in data-intensive distributed collaborations across 11 sites.

7) In what ways can alumni support our department and students?

8) What advice do you have for current undergraduate and graduate students in our department?

Believe in your dreams, follow your passions, and never be afraid to try something that has never been done before!

UNL Speech & Debate Students Claim State Title

The University of Nebraska - Lincoln's speech and debate team were named the state champions at the Nebraska Intercollegiate Forensic Association's State Tournament hosted February 18th at the University of Nebraska - Kearney. This accomplishment is especially

meaningful as the state fielded four of the nation's top 20 teams in 2011.

UNL won the speech tournament with 123 points, the University of Nebraska-Omaha placed second with 109.5 points, and Hastings College placed third with

54.5 points. In addition to the team awards, UNL students captured a total of three individual state championships. Sophomore Grace Kluck of Lincoln won Program Oral Interpretation, sophomore Josh Planos of Omaha won

Dramatic Interpretation and junior Patrick Sather of Bellevue won Prose Interpretation. In the pentathalon award, which recognizes individual students for a combined point total accrued throughout the tournament, junior Lauren Schaal of Omaha was third.

The debate team is coming off a closeout victory in novice division at the Point Loma Nazarene University Tournament in San Diego, California.

The state championship marks the fourth consecutive victory for the UNL team this semester. The team is preparing to compete at the American Forensic Association -

National Individual Events Tournament to be held at Texas State University - San Marcos, April 7th-9th. The debate team is preparing for the National Forensics Association's Tournament to be held at Ohio University, April 20th-23rd.

Tiffany Wang Receives UNL's Outstanding GTA Award

Students Form Gaming Research Group and Blog

In academia, we are behind the curve in incorporating videogame studies into our curriculum. Part of the problem is simply finding a home for this area of study. Communication Studies is the answer to this problem. Our existing body of rhetorical, cultural, organizational, and interpersonal research is a natural fit for the complex social and symbolic interactions that are inherent to gameplay.

With this in mind, UNL Ph.D. Candidate Kane Click started the **Communication Studies Gaming** Research Group in order to gauge student interest in this area of study

while simultaneously promoting its fit in our department. The group's focus includes all manners and modes of gaming, not just videogames. In framing the group in this fashion, it allows us to focus less on the technical aspects of a specific medium and more on the communicative and cultural aspects of gameplay.

Our pilot semester produced a dedicated group of highly motivated students. With their help, we have grown to a rotating base of 15-20 students. The additional peer feedback provided by this growth has greatly aided our students' collective productivity. In order to provide a

suitable showcase for work, we have started a blog, The Gaming Research Report. We have provided a link to our blog in the caption below.

Student response to this area of research has been overwhelmingly positive. We have a dedicated, classsized group that produces high-level work for fun, not credit. In promoting Communication Studies as a department concerned with issues of gaming and gameplay, we have seen a number of our group members switch their majors to ours. This is extremely encouraging and we look forward to seeing this area of research develop in our department.





The Gaming Research Report

One way to thinking about gaming is that it provides an escape from material reality, in this substitution, there is a growing demand to make gameplay more realistic, and has created pressure on developers to oblige the consumer. This quest for realism, however, has led to a rise in lawsuits from companies and athletes over the unauthorized use of their products and likenesses, respectively, in videogames. There has been a movement in videogame development to push for a more authentic gaming experience, and, as a result, companies are engaged in these suits pitting free speech rights versus authorized brand licensing (Roberts, 2012). These lawsuits between developers and corporations will certainly have an influence nuture of the production gamers uemands or increase the authenticity of gameplay. These demands will be appeased by additional product placement in game development. Simulation style gaming will become commonplace, deriving from these emerging expectations for one-to-one realism between the in-game and out-of-game worlds. In order to explore this issue, we will first look at a case involving Electronic Arts (EA) and the helicopter manufacturer Textron.

In May of 2011, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that video games are considered protected speech under the First Amendment (Good, 2012). This rulling has given game developers a broad precedent in the way videogame cases will be ruled, effectively allotting electronic games expanded rights.
