## WHY JOIN A SORORITY?

The Panhellenic Association was created as a governing body to promote the members of women's fraternities in good scholarship, health, fine standards, and service. We believe that a Greek letter organization is a social experience based off people who have shared-values and form voluntary associations arrived at by mutual choice and selection.

**Academics** – At the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, academics is the highest priority. Each chapter works with their new members to keep academics at the center of their college career and provide them with help if it is needed. Sister-to-sister tutoring, required study hours, incentives and minimum GPA requirements are all ways that chapters help their members reach their greatest academic potential. In fact, many members say that being in a sorority helped them learn how to stay organized and meet deadlines. The Office of Fraternity and Sorority Life even offers scholarships to keep academics at a high priority. Finally, the GPA for sorority women is consistently higher than the average of their peers at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

**Service and Philanthropy** – Service is another pillar of sorority life. Each chapter on campus has at least one organization to whom their service efforts are focused on. Service can include going to these organizations and donating their time or holding philanthropy events to donate their funds. Many chapters set service hour goals that each member is expected to meet. Sorority and Fraternity members at this university engage in more community service hours per academic year than any other organization on campus. Collectively, members of our community are active in planning and participating in two of the largest all-campus philanthropic events; Dance Marathon and The Big Event.

**Leadership** – When you join a sorority, you will have many opportunities to develop leadership skills and gain experience. Panhellenic women are encouraged to take on leadership roles within their chapter, as well as become active and involved in student organizations and campus activities outside of sorority life. Panhellenic women participate in athletics, student government, hold leadership positions in a variety of recognized student organizations, and many work a part-time job too!

**Networking** – As a member of a sorority, not only will you be connected to the sisters of your chapter and thousands of sorority and fraternity members at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln but, you will also be connected to thousands of women that are affiliated with your sorority’s national organization. With all of these connections, the possibilities are endless. For example, as an active member of a sorority you will meet other professional women in the career field that you are interested in pursuing. These women can serve as mentors to you or even help you find an internship or job.

**Greek Community** – In addition to campus wide activities and events, sorority life offers many opportunities for students to connect with other members of our community. Whether it’s playing on the chapter intramural team, building a lawn display during Homecoming Week, or performing in the Greek Weekend lip sync competition, there is always a way to get more involved!

**Sisterhood** – The best part about being a member of a sorority is the sisterhood. Being a member of a sorority is a great way to build authentic friendships with other women. When looking back on your college experience, you will remember the memories you created. Whether you need a shoulder to cry on, someone to study with late into the night, or a running buddy, you will be able to find that within your new sisterhood.



# VALUES-BASED RECRUITMENT

## WHAT ARE VALUES?

Values define how we will conduct ourselves, more specifically, in accordance with the founding beliefs of our organization. Each of our organizations has different core values that reveal what is important to them as members of their sorority.

You will see these reflected in all of our programming, events and leadership opportunities.

## NEBRASKA DOES A VALUES-BASED RECRUITMENT

Nebraska's Panhellenic community has a proud history, solid values, and a clear vision for the future. Values-based recruitment helps chapters increase their quantity and quality of members by focusing on meaningful conversations and not decorations, costumes or skits. By using this method, sorority members select women who embody the chapter's values. Potential new members will participate in an activity with their Rho Gamma at the start of the week to determine their personal values. PNMs will also learn how to identify which chapter(s) aligns best with their values through conversation and reflection. Values-Based Recruitment encourages chapter members and PNMs to be their authentic selves throughout the recruitment process.





## RHO GAMMAS

During primary recruitment week, one of your most valuable resources will be your Rho Gamma. Over one hundred active sorority women have been chosen to be your helping hand through primary recruitment. Trained to assist you, they can answer questions you might have about recruitment, sorority life, and college in general.

Chosen for their enthusiasm and positive attitude, Rho Gammas understand that all sororities share common values and are equally strong. Their most important responsibility is to ensure that your recruitment experience is positive. They are there to be your counselor, confidante, and friend. During recruitment, Rho Gammas are not allowed to reveal their sorority affiliation; therefore they can be your unbiased source of information. They are not involved with any chapter's recruitment and are always available to support you.



## RECRUITMENT PROCESS

The recruitment process will begin on Sunday, August 18th. If you are living on campus, you will be able to move into your room at your assigned time. All potential new members will need to check-in for recruitment Sunday evening between 6-7:30 pm in front of the Coliseum. You will receive your name tag, Rho Gamma group assignment, and recruitment gear. We are also asking that you bring some new hygiene products to donate to Voices of Hope Lincoln at this time! At 8:00 pm, join us at the Ed Weir Track for a welcome session. Following the welcome session, meet your Rho Gamma and the other women in your group on the track.

On Monday morning, you will participate in an activity led by your Rho Gamma that will help you focus on your values. You will also attend Greek Life Orientation (GLO), which will give you resources and information on the best ways to acclimate to college life.

On Monday and Tuesday, you will participate in the Open House Round. This is your first opportunity to personally interact with the members of all 16 of our Panhellenic sororities. Don't be nervous to attend these events. Chapter women just want to get to know you better. You will walk from each location to the next with your Rho Gamma and group. After attending all Open House Round events, potential new members will assign a priority ranking to each chapter. As recruitment progresses, the number of chapters visited each day becomes smaller and events become longer. Potential new members will have the opportunity to visit up to ten chapters on Wednesday, up to six on Thursday, and up to two on Friday.

## MONDAY/TUESDAY



On Monday and Tuesday, you will visit all 16 sororities and meet with some of the Panhellenic executives. These are introductory days, giving you an opportunity to meet each chapter. Each event is 20 minutes long.

### DO WEAR

Your recruitment t-shirts with a nicer pair of shorts, pants, or a skirt with comfortable shoes. NO DRESSES OR HEELS.

OPEN HOUSE ROUND

## WEDNESDAY



On Wednesday, you may visit a maximum of ten chapters. You will meet members and learn about the history and focus of each sorority's philanthropic service. Each event is 30 minutes long. This day is semi-casual.

### DO WEAR

A skirt, capris, casual sundress, or pants and a nice shirt, and comfortable shoes (flats or sandals). NO JEANS/DENIM OR HEELS.

PHILANTHROPY ROUND

THURSDAY



On Thursday, you may visit a maximum of six chapters. You will see the individual personalities of each chapter beginning to emerge, plus you will have a chance to tour each chapter living unit. Each event is 45 minutes long.

### DO WEAR

A sundress, skirt, or pant outfit, and comfortable shoes (flats, sandals, wedges or a kitten heel). NO JEANS/DENIM.

SISTERHOOD ROUND

FRIDAY



On Friday, you may visit a maximum of two chapters. During these events, you should begin to see familiar faces and feel a bond with the women around you. You will spend more time at each chapter with 60-minute long events. Following the final event, you will make your membership selection.

### DO WEAR

A nicer dress, skirt, or pant outfit and comfortable shoes (flats, sandals, wedges, or comfortable heels). NO PROM DRESSES OR DENIM.

PREFERENCE ROUND



## SATURDAY



On Saturday, potential new members will receive invitations to membership. You will also learn the chapter affiliation of your Rho Gamma and Panhellenic executive board.

### DO WEAR

A t-shirt or tank top, jeans, shorts, skirt, or capris and comfortable shoes. **NO DRESSES OR HEELS.** New members will receive a t-shirt or tank top from their new chapter, so wear something you can slip the new t-shirt/tank top over easily.

BID DAY

# RECRUITMENT SPEAK

**ACTIVE** – A college undergraduate who has been initiated into fraternity or sorority membership.

**ALUMNA** – An initiated sorority member who has graduated from college.

**BID** – An invitation to join a sorority or fraternity. During Primary (fall) Recruitment no bid (verbal or written) will be extended except through the Panhellenic Association. A bid issued in any other manner is not binding and is in violation of Panhellenic rules. However, bids may be extended verbally or in writing by the chapter(s) during Continuous Open Bidding (Open Recruitment).

**CHAPTER** – A chartered undergraduate or alumnae group recognized by a fraternity or sorority.

**CONTINUOUS OPEN BIDDING (COB)** – An informal process that Panhellenic chapters use to recruit new members outside the designated formal recruitment period to reach quota and/or Panhellenic total. This is less formal and not all chapters are eligible to participate.

**FRATERNITY** – Originating from the Greek word “phratar,” meaning member of a group, this is the term most commonly used to refer to Greek-letter organizations for men. Some sororities are actual women’s fraternities.

**INITIATION** – The ceremony in which a new member becomes an active member.

**LEGACY** – A woman whose mother, sister, or in some cases grandmother, is an alumna or an active member of a sorority. Because each woman is considered on an individual basis, the sorority is not obligated to extend a bid to a legacy. By the same token, a potential new member should choose the group with which she feels most comfortable.

**NATIONAL PANHELLENIC CONFERENCE** – The coordination body of all college Panhellenic Association members in the United States and Canada.

**NEW MEMBER** – A woman who has accepted a bid to join a sorority but has not been initiated.

**PANHELLENIC ASSOCIATION (PHA)** – The governing and programming board for sororities at Nebraska that are associated with the National Panhellenic Conference (NPC).

**PANHELLENIC TOTAL** – The allowable Panhellenic Association chapter size on campus, as determined by the council, including new and active members. Chapters that fall under total may be allowed to participate in Continuous Open Bidding until they reach total.

**PHILANTHROPY** – A charitable fundraiser or service project sponsored by a fraternity or sorority.

**PREFERENCING (PREFFING)** – At the end of the Primary Recruitment preference round, a potential new member indicates which sorority she would like to join by listing a maximum of two sororities in order of preference (first and second choice).

## RECRUITMENT SPEAK

**PRIORITY RANKING** - A process similar to preferencing, potential new members will rank which chapters they would like to return to the next day of primary recruitment. Priority ranking is used following all rounds of recruitment except for the preference round.

**QUOTA** - The specified number of potential new members to which each Panhellenic sorority may extend a bid to during Primary Recruitment.

**RECOMMENDATION/REFERENCE** - A written letter or statement recommending a potential member to a sorority. More information is available in the Q&A section on our website.

**RECRUITMENT** - The process organizations use to bring in new members.

**ROUNDS** - Primary Recruitment consists of a number of structured, timed and themed events. A series of events with the same theme is referred to as a "round." Rounds include: open house, philanthropy, sisterhood and preference rounds.

At the end of each round, you priority rank the chapters visited during the round.

**SISTER** - A term used within a women's fraternity or sorority when referring to other members.

**SORORITY** - A Greek-lettered organization designated for women; also called a women's fraternity.

## Q AND A

### WHAT DO I WEAR?

Although outfits are a common stress for women going through recruitment, it should not be the focus of your recruitment experience. A general guideline is you want to dress in a way that shows respect towards each sorority. If you want some example outfits, check out the pictures included earlier in this handbook. Remember, the days are going to be long and hot! Your main concern should be comfort, as you will be doing a great deal of walking and standing in the sun. The last thing you want to be focused on during Recruitment events are how uncomfortable you are in your outfit or how bad your feet hurt.

### HOW DOES THE RECRUITMENT PROCESS WORK?

Primary recruitment begins the week before the fall semester begins. Each day, you will attend recruitment events at various locations, meeting women from each chapter and finding the chapter in which you could best see yourself. As the week progresses, you will attend fewer events for a longer period of time at each, giving you the opportunity to narrow your choices and devote more time to the chapters with which you feel the strongest connection. The chapters, in turn, will be participating in this mutual selection process and determining those women who best embody their chapter ideals.

## Q AND A

### WHAT HAPPENS AT A RECRUITMENT EVENT?

A recruitment event is a time for potential new members to learn more about individual chapters and for chapter members to learn more about potential new members. Potential new members will meet with and talk to various chapter members, learn about the chapter's values, academics, and philanthropies, and tour the chapter facilities if applicable. Remember, recruitment is a mutual selection process. Just as you are trying to positively represent yourself to the chapters, so are the members working to portray a favorable image of their chapters to you. Most women are meeting you for the first time and will need to ask the same "get to know you" questions. Don't be shy! The more you get to know chapters, and the more they get to know you, the easier it will be to select the chapter which is right for you. Be yourself!

### HOW DO LETTERS OF RECOMMENDATION WORK? WHERE SHOULD I SEND THEM? DO I NEED ONE FOR EACH CHAPTER?

Letters of recommendation from active and alumnae sorority members may be helpful in the recruitment process, they are not necessary by any means. Each chapter has its own policy on letters of recommendation, in order to see the different policies check out the chapter website links on our web page. Letters of recommendation are chapter-specific, and are not shared among all chapters. Many chapters find these recommendation forms helpful in learning information about you that may not be evident from

your application. However, personal contact at each chapter during recruitment events is the best way for sorority members to get to know you.

### WHO WILL HELP ME THROUGHOUT THE WEEK?

Your recruitment guide, also known as Rho Gamma, will help you throughout the week in knowing where to go and what to expect. She will also serve as a coach or confidante if you have any questions or concerns about the recruitment process. Your Rho Gamma will be responsible for a recruitment group composed of other women on your floor or women who are also commuting and participating in recruitment. These groups are an excellent way to meet and bond with your new neighbors and find support at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

### I'M A LEGACY. DOES THAT MEAN I'M GUARANTEED A SPOT IN THAT SORORITY?

Not necessarily. You are considered a legacy if your mother, sister, or in some cases grandmother is an alumna or an active member of a sorority, and each chapter has its own policy regarding legacies. Some chapters may have enough legacies going through recruitment to fill an entire pledge class, but of course there are other factors to consider in the recruitment process, including your application and connection to the women in the chapter. Being a legacy to a chapter is helpful, but will not automatically guarantee you a place in that chapter.

## Q AND A

### WHAT ABOUT RUMORS?

It is possible that you may hear rumors about certain chapters or individual chapter members during recruitment. Speaking unfavorably of a chapter, chapter member, or another potential new member could result in influencing someone's recruitment experience and could get you removed from the recruitment process. Your concern as a potential new member should be learning about those chapters in which you are most interested. If you encounter any negative comments or behavior from active members or potential new members, do not hesitate to report it. Questions and concerns should be directed to your Rho Gamma or the Office of Fraternity and Sorority Life.

### WHAT IF I GET SICK?

There is always a possibility that a potential new member may become ill or have something happen to limit her participation in recruitment. Whatever the situation, don't worry. Alert your Rho Gamma and she will work with you to make other accommodations. The individual chapters are very understanding and will make the appropriate exceptions in these cases. To prevent illness, we recommend you eat before starting the day, and feel free to ask for water or drink from your provided water bottle when you are thirsty. Also, remember that the days are long, so get plenty of rest.

### WHAT IF I NEED ACCOMMODATIONS?

Reasons for accommodations can include but are not limited to, needing wheelchair accessibility for chapter houses, language interpreters, needing a quieter space, or having dietary restrictions. If you need accommodations, please contact the Office of Fraternity and Sorority Life at 402-472-2582 so we can ensure you have a positive recruitment experience.

### I HAVE A SCHEDULING CONFLICT DURING RECRUITMENT WEEK. CAN I STILL PARTICIPATE?

The Office of Fraternity and Sorority Life will work with any woman who has a campus related conflict such as marching band practice, Big Red Singers, or any of the varsity athletic teams. We do not make special accommodations for work conflicts. If you have any questions regarding this policy, please contact the Office of Fraternity and Sorority Life as soon as possible, no later than August 1st.



## CAMPUS LIVING

Students who arrive on August 18th will need to have their NCard scanned at the front desk of their assigned hall, and will be charged the housing guest room rate for Sunday-Tuesday. The rate is \$36 per day (\$108 total). These charges will be posted to your centralized bill, along with your other housing charges. These charges are your responsibility to take care of. Women going through recruitment are currently able to sign up for an early move-in time on their housing portal. Make sure you fill out the early move-in form and specify you will be moving in Sunday, August 18 for sorority recruitment.

Sorority recruitment fees include lunch Monday and Tuesday. PNMs should plan to join their recruitment group for two no-host dinners. All meals Wednesday through Friday will be provided through the dining halls. Additional information on meal services will be provided when PNMs arrive on August 18th.

If you pre-ordered a University parking permit, you should receive it in the mail. However, orders received after August 1st will need to be picked up at Parking and Transit Services.

## CONTACT GUIDELINES

### SUMMER CONTACT

Please be aware that according to the Panhellenic Association recruitment rules, it is illegal for an active, alumna, or chapter to contact you prior to or during the recruitment process. Illegal contact includes lunches, letters, phone calls, or any communication through Facebook, Instagram, Twitter, Snapchat, emails, etc. These guidelines are not intended to dissolve friendships or social relationships that existed prior to Primary Recruitment. Conversation should be focused on the sorority community not individual chapters. Normal social contact is defined as co-workers, roommates, family members, neighbors and close friends.

### RECOMMENDATIONS

A recommendation is an introduction and brief description of a woman interested in recruitment written by an alumna or an active chapter member. Recommendations are helpful during the introductory rounds at the beginning of the week, but are not required. Each chapter has a different policy regarding recommendations, and having a recommendation does not guarantee a potential new member will receive an invitation to join a chapter. Recommendations should be written by someone the potential new member knows personally, and the recommender should send the proper materials directly to the chapters. Recommendations sent to the Office of Fraternity and Sorority Life will be discarded. Potential new members should not spend too much time worrying about these recommendations!



# FINANCIAL INFORMATION

Based on costs of chapter maintenance, membership programming, and social events, financial responsibility is extremely important to individual chapters. It is important that a potential new member joining a sorority understands and is able to meet the financial obligations associated with membership. During Recruitment, a potential new member should ask sorority members about financial obligations. Included is a chart that will give you an idea of high, low, and average sorority costs. The figures do not include optional expenses. A woman living outside the chapter house during her first year of membership pays the new member fee. Many of the chapters require each new member to pay a one-time corporation and initiation fee, a sorority pin is also purchased on or before initiation.

When applicable, each chapter provides the opportunity for women to live in the chapter house at some point. The live-in costs are a compilation of all costs incurred by a member living in the chapter house such as room, board, and other mandatory fees. When a member lives outside the house, she is required to pay a live-out fee. Live-out costs include things such as maintenance fees, social dues, and occasional meals. Live-in and live-out fees are usually paid in installments, but many chapters offer alternative payment plans. It is important to note that each chapter has its own criteria concerning which members may live in or live out of the chapter house.


