Open to teachers of all disciplines and grade levels. This is NeWP's premiere program, following the National Writing Project's Invitational Institute model. Participants in the institute will:

- participate in their own writing;
- share their best teaching practices for writing;
- engage in inquiry and research into aspects of writing.

Institute activities include: writing exercises, visits with local experts in the teaching of writing, participant presentations on their best practices of teaching writing, professional development, practice using various computer technologies to support writing, writing workshops, institute anthology.

STIPEND

Nebraska teachers admitted to the Lincoln Summer Institute may qualify for up to \$750 stipend which helps offset the cost of 6 UNL graduate credits in English or Teaching, Learning, and Teacher Education.

SERVICE LEARNING INSTITUTE

June 6th – June 24th 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m.

Open to teachers of all grade levels, and is for 3 UNL graduate credits in English or Teaching, Learning, and Teacher Education. Past participation in a NeWP Summer or Rural Institute is preferred. This institute explores service learning and community school partnerships.

Institute activities include: exploration of the purpose of education and possible links between teaching and building democracy; writing projects; collaborative inquiry into approaches for connecting schools and communities, service-learning resources, student-driven community research, and social justice teaching practices; shared examination of the challenges and opportunities of community-based learning across the content areas; brainstorming about program-building in our own schools; experiential learning at a community site in Lincoln.
